Good afternoon Jill and Napa City Council Members,

Although the card room has passed initial approval, I am requesting that there be collaboration with the Mishewal Wappo Tribe, the indigenous people of the Napa Valley, aka Talahalusi, who were forcibly relocated to Alexander Valley. I would like to see a portion of all earnings to be given to the tribe, who are legally able to provide gaming in California as an official Native American Tribe. Because these areas have **tribal** sovereignty, states have limited ability to forbid **gambling** there, as codified by the **Indian Gaming** Regulatory Act of 1988. The property Owner could donate a portion of their land to the Mishewal Wappo to put it in a Federal Trust.

An example of how this was done in the San Francisco Bay Area can be looked to model after the **Sogorea Te Land Trust** which is an <u>urban land trust</u> founded in 2012 with the goals of returning traditionally <u>Chochenyo</u> and <u>Karkin</u> lands in the <u>San Francisco Bay Area</u> to <u>indigenous</u> stewardship and cultivating more active, reciprocal relationships with the land.

## Shuumi Land Tax[edit]

In order to financially support their goals, the Sogorea Te Land Trust has begun a project that it calls the Shuumi Land Tax (*shuumi* means "gift" in Ohlone languages<sup>[3]</sup>), which asks non-indigenous people living on Ohlone land to pay dues for the land that they live on. <sup>[1]</sup> The tax has no legal ramifications and no connection with the United States government or Internal Revenue Service, but the organization prefers this term (as opposed to merely calling contributions donations) as it asserts indigenous sovereignty. <sup>[5]</sup> The suggested tax amount is calculated based on the would-be taxpayer's usage of the land: renters are asked to pay a small percentage of their rent, homeowners are expected to pay based on the number of rooms (for an estimated total between \$65 and \$500). <sup>[5]</sup> Those who use the land for commercial purposes are expected to make a contribution based on the size and scale of their business. <sup>[6]</sup>
