5.B. <u>418-2021</u> 2022 City Council Calendar

Adopted Resolution R2021-109 establishing the 2022 Calendar for Regular City Council Meetings and City Holidays, and approving the cancellation of a regular meeting of the City Council on July 5, 2022.

Enactment No: R2021-109

5.C. <u>425-2021</u> Bicycle and Trails Advisory Commission Membership

Appointed incumbent, Cynthia J. Deutsch, and new member, Maureen C. Trippe, to the Bicycle and Trails Advisory Commission for terms effective immediately and ending September 30, 2023.

5.D. <u>397-2021</u> Emergency Replacement of Oak Street Storm Drain

Determined there was a need to continue the emergency action to execute and implement construction contracts for the replacement of the Oak Street Storm Drain from Franklin Street to Brown Street; approve a transfer from the RMRA Fund to the CIP Project Fund and a project budget increase of \$200,000, as documented in Budget Adjustment Form No. BE2211504; and determine that the actions authorized by this item are exempt from CEQA.

5.E. <u>408-2021</u> State Route 29 Bicycle and Pedestrian Undercrossing Project

Authorized the Public Works Director to execute on behalf of the City an amendment to Agreement No. C2021-173 with GHD Inc. for engineering design and project management services for the State Route 29 Bicycle and Pedestrian Undercrossing project in the increased amount of \$25,225 for a total contract amount not to exceed \$449,584, and determine that the actions authorized by this item were adequately analyzed by a previous CEQA action.

5.F. <u>411-2021</u> Appointment of City Treasurer

Adopted Resolution R2021-110 to appoint Finance Director Anne Cardwell as City Treasurer.

5.G. <u>412-2021</u> Monthly Budget and Investment Statement

Received the Monthly Budget and Investment Statement as of September 30, 2021.

5.H. <u>422-2021</u> Purchase of Three (3) Fire Engines

Adopted Resolution R2021-111: (1) amending the FY2021/22 Fleet Replacement Schedule, Appendix H; (2) authorizing the Fire Chief to execute a contract with Pierce Manufacturing, Inc. on behalf of the City of up to \$2,490,000 for the purchase of three Fire Engines; and (3) approving an expenditure budget increase of \$840,000 to the Fire Apparatus Replacement Fund, as documented in Budget Adjustment No. BE2211505.

Enactment No: R2021-111

5.I. <u>369-2021</u> Proposition 68 Per Capita Grant Application

Adopted Resolution R2021-112 authorizing the Parks and Recreation Services Director to submit an application to the California Department of Parks and Recreation for the "Proposition 68" grant program in an amount up to \$ \$177,952 with a 20% matching requirement from the City.

6.A. <u>317-2021</u> Proclamation of Local Emergency to Respond to the Coronavirus (COVID-19)

City Manager Potter provided the report.







