


Increase in Call Volume Over the Past Decade






Project Review 97.2% Increase Over 2020



JOSEPH "JOE"ROBERT BAEZ 1943 - 2021

Captain Baez was hired by the Napa Fire Department on December 21, 1969 by Fire Chief Pete Daglia and was assigned badge #94. Joe and retired Battalion Chief Ken Lloyd were hired on the same day and worked together for many years as part of the C-Shift crew. Joe was one of the first paramedics in the Napa Fire Department Paramedic Program, which was placed into service on July 1, 1978. Joe was the first Hispanic firefighter hired by the Napa Fire Department. A fond memory of Joe happened after Joe had been working as a firefighter for a couple of years. There was a vehicle accident on the highway with a patient who was Spanish speaking only. Fire Chief Milton Ochs requested Joe to respond Code 3 to the scene of the accident to assist with patient care. After Joe arrived on scene, Chief Ochs requested "Joe, ask the patient where he is hurt" and Joe (a bit puzzled) proceeded to ask the patient "where are you hurt?" Chief Ochs then said "No, I mean ask him in Spanish" to which Joe replied "Chief, I don't speak Spanish." Joe would later, good naturedly admit that was one of the most memorable moments in his career at the Napa Fire Department. Joe played on the Napa Fire Department football team, which was undefeated against the Police Department. He was also known for his enjoyment of the game of golf and participated in many golf tournaments over the years. He was also very involved in volunteering at the Napa Fire Department corn booth every year at the Napa Town & Country Fair. Joe Retired from the Napa Fire Department on May 31, 1998 after serving the community of Napa for 28+ years. He will be immensely missed by all who had the honor and pleasure of working with him at the Napa Fire Department.
